Jarred and Megan Etheredge

The Etheredge family serves in a rural area of South Africa, approximately four hours north and slightly east of Johannesburg. Their ministry focuses on both community engagement and church development, with the goal of spreading the gospel and equipping local believers for discipleship and leadership.

Ministry Approach

Their work is centered around two primary aspects. First, they engage with the local community through agriculture and skill-building training. These initiatives serve as practical tools while also providing opportunities to teach biblical discipleship principles and share the gospel through real-life applications.



Second, they partner with a network of local churches through the pastoral fraternal. Their role is to come alongside pastors and lay leaders, equipping them with the knowledge and resources to evangelize, disciple, and strengthen their congregations. This collaboration has led to the planting of their first church in a nearby village—an area that previously had no Christian presence.

Goals for 2025

The Etheredge family has set several key goals for the coming years:

- Training Center Development Completing the initial phase of their training center, which will allow them to hold monthly on-site training for up to 100 people and provide housing for 25 trainees.
- 2. Church Plant Establishment Finalizing the church plant and appointing a local leader to shepherd the congregation.
- 3. Pastoral Conferences Hosting three annual conferences in partnership with the pastoral fraternal to strengthen biblical teaching and encourage sound doctrine within local churches.

The Community They Serve

The Etheredge family primarily works among the Pedi tribe, the third-largest tribal group in South Africa, comprising approximately 10% of the national population. The Pedi maintain a traditional kingship structure, with local chiefs overseeing individual villages. Their customs closely resemble those of the Zulu people. Historically known for their strength and militancy, the Pedi today are largely peaceful and community-oriented.

Challenges

While cultural and language barriers are inherent challenges in cross-cultural ministry, the greatest difficulties they face are spiritual. One of the most significant challenges is addressing the aftermath of mass evangelism movements from the late 20th century, which emphasized conversion without discipleship. As a result, many people in their region practice a form of syncretism, blending biblical teachings with ancestral worship.

A dominant force in the region is the Zion Christian Church (ZCC), which claims about 85% of the Pedi population as followers. Despite its name, the ZCC does not recognize Jesus as the Son of God but instead venerates their bishop, Le Kanyane, as their mediator to God. Ancestor worship is a key aspect of their faith, and reports suggest that human sacrifice is practiced during their annual pilgrimage to their main compound, Moriah.

Additionally, many churches in the area focus on healing and deliverance ministries, emphasizing performancedriven worship and pastoral idolatry. Apostolic movements, along with small Muslim and Hindu communities, are also present.

Spiritual Landscape

Biblically sound churches make up less than 10% of the faith community in their area. True evangelical believers are similarly scarce. However, approximately 35% of the population has been exposed to some aspects of the gospel, though many lack a full understanding of biblical truth.

Despite these challenges, the Etheredge family remains committed to their mission of making Christ known, strengthening the local church, and equipping believers to stand firm in their faith. Through agricultural training, pastoral development, and church planting, they continue to serve as faithful witnesses in South Africa

Joshua and Meagan Phiri ^{Zambia}

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The Phiris serve in three districts of the Southern Province of Zambia. Their ministry focuses on reaching the most neglected communities with the gospel, bringing both spiritual transformation and practical support to those in need. Through church planting, community development, and village outreach, they are committed to serving "the least and the lost," ensuring that even the most remote and underserved areas have access to the message of Christ.

Ministry Approach

Their work includes church services, Bible studies, youth and children's ministry, and personal evangelism through house-to-house visits and counseling. They partner with local leaders and international mission teams to provide ministry that respects cultural traditions while introduc-



ing biblical truth. In addition to sharing the gospel, their ministry extends to educational programs, healthcare initiatives, and sustainable development projects that improve quality of life in struggling communities.

Mission Goals

One of their primary goals is to plant churches across fifteen districts of Zambia's Southern Province. They are passionate about training and equipping local leaders to sustain and expand the work of the ministry. Recognizing the importance of leadership development, they provide theological education and practical training to ensure churches remain strong and biblically sound.

The People They Serve

The communities Joshua and Meagan serve are diverse and deeply rooted in cultural heritage. Many people in these regions face economic hardship, limited access to healthcare, and educational barriers. Most rely on subsistence farming or small trades to provide for their families. Despite these challenges, they are resilient, hospitable, and eager to embrace opportunities for growth and transformation.

Spiritually, the region is a mix of Christianity, traditional African religions, Islam, and secular beliefs. Many individuals blend Christianity with indigenous customs, making discipleship and biblical teaching a critical aspect of Joshua and Meagan's work.

Challenges

Ministering in these communities presents unique challenges. Some of the key obstacles include:

- 1. Traditional Beliefs: Many communities have deep-rooted traditions that sometimes conflict with Christian teachings, requiring cultural sensitivity and wisdom.
- Economic Struggles: Poverty often forces people to prioritize survival over spiritual growth, making consistent discipleship difficult.
- 3. Limited Church Resources: Many local churches face challenges such as lack of trained leadership and inadequate resources, requiring strong discipleship and church support initiatives.

Mickeal and Sharon Quillman

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Sharon and I moved to Zambia in August of 2022 with a passion to reach the people of Zambia with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We are now serving in the Sekute (seh-koo-tay) chiefdom in the southern province of Zambia. This chiefdom is made up of Lozi, Tonga, and Tokaleya people groups. In November, we planted a church, Chabantu Missionary Baptist Church, and are in the process of training three local men as pastors. Chabantu is a Tonga word meaning "for all of the people," which implies that everyone is welcome to attend, regardless of their tribe or village. During the week, we spend our time conducting Bible studies, learning local languages and culture, and meeting with local headmen about bringing the good news into previously unreached villages. The three local men being trained as pastors are partnering with us to teach Bible studies in other villages throughout the week.



Sharon has begun teaching the local women within the surrounding villages as well. These ladies are so excited to have the opportunity to learn.

The area we are working in consists primarily of the Tonga, Tokaleya, and Lozi tribes, each of which speak their own languages. Villages are made up of family groups governed by a headman who answers to a senior headman that oversees 25 village headmen. The senior headman reports to the tribal chief. Many of these villages use traditional medicine, which is overseen by witchdoctors. White skin is seen as having a lot of money and being willing to just give it away.

Prayer Requests:

- New church plant, Chabantu Missionary Baptist Church and the three men we are training as pastors: Lackson, Danny, and, Felix
- Guidance of the Holy Spirit as we navigate the cultural differences, as well as wisdom, protection, and guidance as we combat animism, spiritualism, and witchcraft
- · Funds to complete the church building and our support fund

Praises:

- · Permanent work permits have been issued.
- Chabantu Missionary Baptist Church is growing. It is made up of several villages including Chibinga, Kawewa, Kainyandela, Luvinda, Dube, Mulingula, Simondo, Makunka, and Simanyungu.
- Many men and women we meet with have a hunger to learn.
- We received permission from the tribal council to enter any village in the Sekute chiefdom and conduct Bible studies and plant churches.

The Johnson Family

The Johnsons live in Beijing, China—a vast metropolis of over 20 million people, home to both a rich tapestry of local Chinese cultures and a diverse expatriate community. Since moving to China, their ministry has evolved significantly. Initially focused on reaching the Han Chinese majority, they soon expanded to include local minorities. In the past seven years, their primary focus has shifted toward serving the expatriate community in Beijing. Through gospel-centered discipleship and training, they equip both expats and locals to become effective witnesses for Christ in their spheres of influence.

Ministry Approach

Due to Chinese laws prohibiting evangelism to locals, they practice wisdom and discretion in sharing the gospel. They do not engage in public evangelism, such as street preaching or distributing tracts. Instead, they prioritize organic, relational evangelism. One of their key initiatives, "1,000 Gospel Conversations," encourages believers to share their faith with friends, family, and colleagues.



Participants document these conversations, allowing them to pray, provide accountability, and follow up when possible. Their philosophy is simple: "We can't create conversion, but we can start a conversation." To further equip believers, they also offer evangelism classes, including training on how to share the gospel in Chinese.

Mission and Goals

Their ultimate goal is to reach the nations for Christ. Living in a highly transient city presents a unique opportunity for global missions. Every year, they witness individuals from various countries—Brazil, Canada, China, Ghana, South Africa, Spain, and more—come to faith and be baptized. Most of these believers will eventually return to their home countries. Their vision is to disciple them so that they leave Beijing equipped to share the gospel wherever they go.

They have already seen this mission bear fruit. On a micro level, individuals like Markus from South Africa, who left a same-sex relationship after encountering Christ, now actively shares the gospel with others in his home country. On a macro level, they have sent out believers to plant churches in their native lands, including Kosei in Tokyo, Paul in Boulder, and Brett in Melbourne. They also anticipate launching a new church plant on the Westside of Beijing soon.

The Community They Serve

Their community is a beautiful representation of the global church. With individuals from over 60 nations and all walks of life, their gatherings provide a glimpse of heaven's diversity. The people they serve generally fall into three categories:

- 1. Those who were running from God but encountered Jesus in Beijing and now have powerful testimonies.
- 2. Those who grew up in church but never took their faith seriously until they found a passion for God in Beijing.
- 3. Those who intentionally came to China to be missional, whom they support, encourage, and equip.

Challenges

Legal restrictions remain their greatest challenge. They have experienced police raids, arrests, deportations, and difficulties securing consistent meeting spaces. Though conditions have been relatively stable since January 2024, they remain vigilant, knowing that government policies can change abruptly. These challenges, however, serve to strengthen their faith and compel believers to count the cost of following Jesus.

Religious Landscape

China officially recognizes five religions: Buddhism, Catholicism, Daoism, Islam, and Protestantism. Survey data suggests that China is 74% atheist, with the remaining population comprising Buddhists (15%), Daoists (8%), Christians (2%), and Muslims (1%). Due to the underground nature of many churches, exact numbers for Christians are difficult to determine, but despite the growing church, China remains largely unreached.

In Beijing, they help oversee 11 international churches, most of which are organized by language groups (Korean, Russian, French, Cantonese, Mandarin, etc.). Additionally, they maintain relationships with four or five other biblically sound international churches. However, they are cautious about certain churches that promote unbiblical teachings— such as excessive focus on generational curses or affirming ideologies contrary to Scripture.

Common Belief Systems

Both locals and expatriates in China tend to embrace a secular, self-reliant worldview. The prevailing mindset is that success and happiness are achieved through personal effort, with little thought given to a higher power. This creates a unique challenge but also an incredible opportunity to introduce people to the truth of the gospel.

The Johnsons remain committed to making Christ known in Beijing and beyond, trusting in God's sovereignty and the power of the gospel to transform lives.

Jeremy and Mandy Hambrice

Paisley, Myli, Havana, and Emmi Rose Papua New Guinea jeremy_hambrice@ntm.org

The Hambrice family serves in the remote Eastern Highlands Province of Papua New Guinea, ministering to the Wantakia tribe in the village of Pinji. Their vision extends beyond Pinji, as they seek to reach the nine surrounding villages with the gospel.

Church Planting and Discipleship

By God's grace, the Hambrices and their team planted a church in 2020 and have since been actively discipling and teaching the local believers. Their ministry initially involved large village outreaches, where they taught chronologically from Creation to Christ and through the end times over three-month periods. Their second outreach in 2022 reinforced these teachings.



Now that the church is established, they focus on smaller, in-home Bible stud-

ies with those who show interest. The church meets on Sundays, primarily led by local Bible teachers in training. Women from the church lead a children's Bible study on Saturdays, and an adult Bible study is held in a round hut on Friday nights. Their next major step is planting a church in a neighboring village in the coming year.

Goals

The Hambrices are committed to discipling and strengthening the local church to maturity, ensuring that elders and deacons are raised up to lead the congregation independently while remaining firmly rooted in God's Word.

Another major goal is Bible translation. Significant progress has already been made, and they are committed to continuing this work so that the Wantakia people can access the Scriptures in their own language. They also plan to establish a youth ministry in the next year to engage teenagers with the gospel.

Additionally, they support a literacy program, now fully run by local believers, to equip more people to read God's Word for themselves.

The People They Serve

The Wantakia people are primarily planters and gatherers, living in small round houses made from jungle materials. Their daily lives revolve around cooking over open fires and cultivating coffee trees, which provide income through sales to roasters in larger towns.

Spiritually, the Wantakia people hold animistic beliefs, convinced that all things possess spirits. They live in fear of spirit beings, believing that a distant, evil creator made these spirits to harm mankind. Their way of life revolves around appeasing and manipulating these spirits to avoid misfortune.

Challenges

The Hambrices face several challenges in ministering to the Wantakia people, including:

- 1. Lack of Interest Among Unbelievers: Many in the village remain indifferent to God's Word, making outreach difficult.
- Opposition from Other Religious Groups: Unbiblical teachings from local Lutheran and Seventh-Day Adventist groups, which are heavily syncretized with animistic beliefs, create confusion and resistance.
- 3. Faithfulness in Leadership: Developing strong, committed local leaders is a constant challenge as the church grows.

Spiritual Landscape

Out of approximately 500 villagers in Pinji, around 150 have come to faith in Christ. However, they remain the only believers in a language group of 10,000 people. The Hambrices are working to change that by spreading the gospel to more villages and strengthening the local church.

Looking Ahead

Through church planting, discipleship, Bible translation, and literacy programs, the Hambrices remain steadfast in their mission to bring the truth of the gospel to the Wantakia people. They continue to trust in God's provision as they work toward expanding His kingdom in Papua New Guinea.

BJ and Jill Sanders Papua New Guinea

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As church planters in the mountains of Papua New Guinea, we have developed an alphabet for the Wantakia people, taught them how to read, and are translating the Bible into their language. As we translate, we have the pleasure of teaching the Wantakians.

There are 800 different languages in Papua New Guinea. Wantakia is one of those, situated in the mountains at 8,000 feet. Among the Wantakia people, there are nine villages. As the church grows and gets excited about spreading the Gospel, they are excited to reach the other eight villages.

Danny and Rita Ballard serve in the Luzon Island region of the Philippines, residing in Sto. Tomas, Batangas, about 70 kilometers south of Metro Manila. Their ministry extends across various communities, focusing on church planting, discipleship, and outreach.

The Ballards are engaged in a multi-faceted ministry, partnering with ChangeMaker Vincent Ferrer to support five established mission churches and actively exploring two additional locations for future church planting. Their work includes:

- Children's Ministry
- Bible Study & Discipleship
- Cancer Support Ministry
- BTCP Training (Biblical Training Center for Pastors)
- Relief Ministry

Goals and Vision



The Ballards are committed to church planting and discipleship, particularly among those who are economically disadvantaged. Their vision includes developing a model for urban church planting, as most of their efforts have been in rural areas where costs are lower and outreach is more accessible.

The People They Serve

The Ballards primarily minister to the less fortunate, many of whom have limited education and struggle daily to meet basic needs. God has placed these individuals on their hearts, and they find deep connections in serving and relating to them.

Challenges

One of the most significant obstacles in their mission is the deep-rooted Catholic background of the Filipino people. Many view their Catholic identity as synonymous with being Christian, making it difficult to introduce biblical salvation apart from religious traditions. The desire to please foreigners can also present challenges, as some individuals may superficially agree to salvation without a genuine heart change. However, the Ballards have found that studying Scripture together allows the Holy Spirit to work, leading people to ask questions and seek truth on their own.

Religious Landscape

The religious environment in Sto. Tomas reflects the broader religious demographics of the Philippines:

- Roman Catholicism 78.8%
- Iglesia ni Cristo (INC) 4.2% (A non-Trinitarian group with strict doctrinal views)
- Philippine Independent Church 1.4%
- Seventh-day Adventist Church 1.3%
- Other Christian groups 3.8%
- Islam 6.4%

While there are approximately 14 Baptist churches in the area, doctrinal beliefs vary, making biblical clarity and sound teaching essential. Many people claim to be Christian simply because they are Catholic, highlighting the need for genuine gospel-centered discipleship.

Doug and Diane Lee

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Doug and Diane Lee serve in Talisay City on Negros Island, Philippines, where they are dedicated to equipping future Christian leaders through theological education, church planting, and community outreach. Their ministry plays a role in training pastors, teachers, and church workers who will spread the gospel throughout the Philippines and beyond.

BMA Bible College

Dr. Doug Lee is the Director and President of BMA Bible College, the central hub for theological education and ministry training in the region. The college saw record-breaking enrollment in the 2024-25 school year, with 97 students, far exceeding the capacity of the dorms—a challenge they consider a blessing!



Accredited by the Philippine government, the college offers degrees in Theology, Christian Education, and Church Music. Both Doug and Diane serve as instructors, investing deeply in the spiritual and academic growth of their students.

Beyond the classroom, they are involved in Bible studies and church planting efforts in four different areas, expanding their reach in the community and strengthening local churches.

The People They Serve

The Filipino people are warm, hospitable, and receptive to the gospel. While the majority identify as Roman Catholic, many do so in name only, without active church involvement. The country has a wide economic gap, with most people being either extremely poor or extremely rich, though a growing middle class is emerging.

- · Continued financial support for their personal needs and for the Bible College.
- · Health and safety for themselves, the staff, faculty, and students.
- · Funding for solar panels to reduce high electricity costs.
- · Expansion of online theology classes to pastors in Kenya.

- Over 700 people have come to Christ through students' weekend mission work and church internships!

Through their commitment to theological education, church planting, and discipleship, the Lees continue to make a lasting impact in the Philippines and beyond.

Sean and Kendall Pasley

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Sean and Kendal Pasley serve in Chambéry, the capital city of Savoie, in southeastern France, near the Swiss border. Their long-term mission is church planting, a process that requires years of deep investment in relationships and community life.

Ministry Focus

Sean has had the opportunity to preach in multiple churches, becoming part of a regular preaching rotation. While their ultimate goal is to plant a church, they recognize the necessity of building relationships before the gospel can be shared effectively. In France, gospel conversations typically come after years of trust and friendship.

Main Goals

The Pasleys are committed to:

- Evangelism Engaging in long-term, relational gospel conversations.
- Church Planting Laying the groundwork for a doctrinally sound church in their region.
- Community Integration Becoming a known and trusted presence in their city.

The People They Serve

The French people are highly skeptical of religion, often viewing Christianity as either a mindless tradition or a crutch for the weak. Many assume that faith is irrational, and they resist the idea of absolute truth. Culturally, they value philosophical discussion over practical application, making it challenging to encourage an active, lived-out faith.

The French also tend to be private and socially reserved, making deep friendships difficult to establish. Leisure and personal enjoyment are highly prioritized, sometimes at the expense of spiritual growth.

Challenges

- Breaking Through Skepticism Convincing people that faith in Christ is a rational and necessary decision.
- · Encouraging Active Faith Many French believers engage with Christianity philosophically, but not practically.
- Patience in Gospel Conversations It takes many conversations over a long period to even discuss spiritual matters.
- Cultural Aversion to Absolutes The French view exclusive truth claims as extreme, making it difficult to
 proclaim Christ as the only way to salvation.

Spiritual Landscape in France

- Only 2% of France's 69 million people identify as evangelical Christians (including groups like Jehovah's Witnesses and Mormons).
- The CNEF (National Council of Evangelicals in France) aims to establish 1 church for every 10,000 people, but the country is far from reaching that goal.
- In Savoie, there are only 12 Protestant churches, and only 2 that Sean considers doctrinally sound.

Religious Climate

- · Catholicism Once dominant, now largely cultural or mixed with charismatic movements.
- Islam France has the largest Muslim population in the EU, with a growing influence, particularly among immigrant communities.
- · Secularism The French identity is deeply secular, making religious belief a private, often ridiculed matter.

Long-Term Commitment

The Pasleys are dedicated to a lifetime of ministry in France. They pray that their sons will also serve in French-speaking Europe, recognizing that meaningful gospel work in France takes decades of faithful presence.

As part of a church planting team, we started house church services. I also help teach university students a course called "Relational wisdom." I help with a ministry in the Roma community teaching them to read and write, and once a month I do street evangelism together with my church. I also lead the church's women's group and try to build relationships with people while working part time at a coffee shop.

As we started the street evangelism ministry, we discovered that people are very open to talk, but many young people seem very confused about their beliefs. Recently, I discovered that there is a big gap between the old generation that are Orthodox Christians (mostly just by name) and the new generation that believes in reincarnation. The population of the city that I serve has grown a lot in the last years and now we have more internationals that we can reach.

Cristian and Vanessa Martinez serve in Braşov, a major city in central Romania. Braşov is a top travel destination and home to one of Romania's main universities, making it a strategic location for ministry among both young professionals and students.

Ministry Approach

Their ministry is built on both public outreach and relational evangelism. They:

- Meet primarily in homes for worship, fellowship, and discipleship.
- Engage in evangelistic outreach in public spaces during summer months.
- Focus on hospitality and deeper connections during winter.
- Equip believers to love their neighbors, practice hospitality, and share the gospel as a way of life.
- · Host regular Bible studies for those interested in learning more about Jesus.

Goals

- Make the gospel available to all people and trust God for the results.
- Display the gospel through holiness, unity, and love in the church.
- · Preach the gospel faithfully and clearly to every person they encounter.
- · Plant churches and send missionaries to unreached people groups south of Romania.

The People They Serve

The Martinez family serves two distinct communities:

- · City Ministry Educated Romanian professionals and college students.
- Village Ministry Gypsy families with many children.

Their ministry connects the two by:

- Encouraging city church members to serve in the villages.
- · Engaging college students in one-on-one tutoring to help village children with reading and writing.

Challenges

- · Many Romanians lack basic biblical knowledge and are indifferent to Christianity.
- · People often do not see their need for salvation.
- There is a long process from hearing the gospel to repentance and faith.
- · Evangelism is often lacking in the local church culture, with few outreach efforts beyond church walls.

Spiritual Landscape of Braşov

- Population: ~300,000
- Biblically Sound Churches: Fewer than 10
- Evangelical Population: Only 2% of the city's residents
- Most new believers are young people raised in Christian homes, with very few conversions from outside the church.

Religious Context

- 87% of Romanians identify as Orthodox, and being Romanian is often equated with being Orthodox.
- Orthodox opposition to Evangelicals can be strong and sometimes even violent, particularly in rural areas.

The couple's ministry revolves around weekly Bible studies in their home, where both seekers and believers gather to study the Bible, enjoy fellowship, and engage in Gospel discussions over snacks and games.

Jacob also mentors a local pastor, providing teaching on church ministry, doctrine, and sermon preparation. They actively support a

Religious Landscape

- Hinduism is the dominant religion, with daily worship directed at three main gods, alongside countless others.
- Tibetan Buddhism and Islam also have a presence.
- Hinduism and Buddhism are often blended, with Hindus worshiping Buddha and Buddhists visiting Hindu temples.

Jacob and Miriam remain dedicated to planting seeds of faith, discipling believers, and training leaders as they serve in the Himalayas, trusting God to bring lasting transformation in the hearts of the people.

- With only 1-2% of Thailand's population identifying as Christian, the lack of sound Bible-teaching churches is deeply discouraging. Some believers in rural areas resort to online worship due to the absence of faithful churches nearby.

Goals

- Find the right Thai partner to co-labor in church planting.
- Establish a new church in Bangkok that is faithful to the gospel.
- Continue evangelizing and discipling in their new area.
- · Support their Thai friend's ordination process and help him prepare for pastoral ministry.
- · Raise up local church leaders who will serve with humility and faithfulness.

Out of Thailand's 70 million people, less than 1% are evangelical Christians, making biblically faithful churches rare both in Bangkok and throughout the country.

Ministry Goals

- · Faithfully preach and teach God's Word at North Bangkok Church.
- Train and equip Thai pastors and preachers through annual preaching seminars.
- Continue writing biblical resources to strengthen Thai churches.
- Expand their online ministry, producing video content for Thai believers.

- · Building relationships and gaining trust within the community.
- Laying the foundation for future gospel work, with the vision of planting a healthy, indigenous church among this people group.

The People She Serves

This group is an ethnically Chinese Muslim population that fled China in the mid-1800s and settled on the border of two Central Asian countries. Their language blends Mandarin with Arabic and Persian influences, and their culture is deeply rooted in Islam and Tengrism. Though they are warm and hospitable, the gospel is virtually unknown among them, with only 0.04% identifying as believers.

Challenges

- Language & Cultural Barriers Learning two languages is essential for clear gospel communication.
- · Islamic Strongholds The perception of Christianity within the community is often negative.
- Creative Access & Security Finding safe and sustainable ways to live and minister among the people.
- Persecution of Believers New followers of Christ may face rejection or opposition.

Current Spiritual Landscape

- No known churches exist among this people group within the country where AJ serves.
- A few biblically sound churches exist in the national language in major cities, but many in this group do not speak the national language or live near these churches.
- Encouragingly, in the neighboring country, early efforts are underway, including the beginnings of a Bible translation in their language.

Challenges

- Overcoming cultural and religious barriers as many are deeply tied to their traditions.
- Reaching people who are "Christian by name" but do not have a personal relationship with Christ.

Religious Landscape

- · There are five Evangelical Arabic churches in the area.
- BMA Arabic Church is the only Baptist Arabic church in Orlando.
- · Other Arabic-speaking churches include:

- · The most common religious groups they encounter:
 - Nominal Christians (Christian by name but not in faith)
 - Muslims

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Juan and Hannah Fernandez are dedicated to reaching Hispanic immigrants in the Metro East area through personal evangelism, discipleship, and community outreach. Their ministry includes:

- Daily prayer walks in work areas such as roofing sites, construction zones, restaurants, and RV parks where many Hispanic workers live.
- Producing online devotionals & short videos to engage and inform Hispanic immigrants about their outreach efforts.
- Building relationships through local soccer leagues and gym visits to expand their evangelistic network.



Ministry Goals

- Develop a prayer team to intercede for evangelistic efforts.
- Establish three discipleship groups in Florissant, Chesterfield, and Granite City.
- Form a Core Team of three families to assist in ministry.
- Connect with businesses that employ Hispanic workers to offer devotional support.

People They Serve

- Hispanic men (ages 18-65), first-generation immigrants who primarily speak Spanish.
- Many arrive in debt to transporters and struggle with substance addiction as they cope with the challenges of starting over in the U.S.
- They are driven by the American dream, constantly moving from town to town in search of work and better opportunities.

Challenges

- · Limited time to minister due to workers' demanding schedules.
- Building trust among a transient community unfamiliar with BMA or Baptist beliefs.
- Strong superstitions and reliance on spiritual guidance from non-Christian sources.

Religious Landscape

- Strong Catholic influence, with packed churches on Sundays (80-120 per mass).
- 3-4 Protestant charismatic groups meet weekly for worship.
- · Many immigrants lack biblical knowledge but are open to spiritual discussions.

- · Strength and endurance to remain steadfast in ministry.
- · Godly friendships and community for their family and children.
- · Completion of their garage project to create a space for ministry outreach.
- · Opportunities to connect with more families and establish a strong support network.

- Rescuing young people from gangs They have a thriving youth ministry and need room to welcome more families and young people seeking transformation.
- · New church plants Praying for doors to open in Houston, Ohio, and Nanuet, NY.

- The U.S. Hispanic population reached 62.1 million in 2020, making it the second-largest ethnic group in the country.
- Hispanics are one of the most responsive groups to the gospel. According to Pew Research, 80 out of every 100 Hispanic immigrants respond positively to the gospel.
- The dominant religion among Hispanics is Catholicism.

- There are also Hindu and Muslim adherents, especially among international students.

- Sharing the gospel through Bible studies, personal outreach, and community events.
- Integrating cultural understanding to communicate the gospel effectively.

The People They Serve

Challenges in Ministry

- Sustainability Ensuring long-term growth and stability for their ministry and church.
- Space Constraints Finding a suitable location to meet and grow as a church.

- Morgan is home to only one evangelical church serving a population of 5,000.
- The entire county has just two evangelical churches among 14,000 residents.
- The local high school graduates 250-300 students per year, showing the need for a strong gospel witness in future generations.

- Hosting evangelistic events to foster relationships and disciple new believers.

Many of the people they serve have fled war-torn countries and are in desperate need of hope, stability, and community.

- Sharing the gospel with unreached Arabic-speaking people.
- · Evangelizing and making disciples who will follow Christ and lead others to Him.
- Building bridges between the church and the refugee community through acts of love and service.

People They Serve

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Michael and Laura Beth Strong are committed to helping people flourish in their life-long pursuit of Jesus Christ. They serve in a low-income area of Minneapolis, focusing on creating disciples who are deeply rooted in the Word of God.

Their ministry is life-on-life, meaning they spend intentional time with people so they can learn from their daily walk with the Lord. A significant part of their work includes identifying and training local men to become church planters, pastors, and revitalizers.

Spiritual Landscape

Minneapolis is home to many religions, including Islam, Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Mormonism, Jehovah's Witnesses, and various forms of paganism like Wicca. There is also a strong presence of Catholic and hyper-charismatic churches, spreading false gospels and confusing many in the community.



The church plant consists almost entirely of new believers, which presents challenges in discipleship and spiritual growth. Michael and Laura Beth are dedicated to helping these believers mature in their faith and become deeply grounded in God's Word.

Prayer Requests

- Financial Support As the church grows, so do ministry expenses. Additional partnerships are needed to help sustain and expand the work.
- Faithful Discipleship They need more mature believers to come alongside them in discipling the many new believers who have joined the church in the past year or two.
- Spiritual Growth Praying that each member of the church plant is grounded in the Word and keeps Jesus Christ at the center of their life.

Praises

- God's Faithfulness Over the past year, they have seen eleven people come to Christ, with seven baptized so far.
- Growth in Faith Church members are stepping out to use their gifts in ministry.
- New Ministry Initiatives Members have begun a worship team and are serving in children's and youth ministry.





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
